Manx Quilting



I was chatting to a fellow crafter at market two weeks ago, when I spied what I thought was log cabin quilting. How wrong was I! What my fellow crafter was doing was Manx Quilting. Now I have to admit that I have never heard of this before, so a bit of online research later I have now found out about this variation. From what I can find out, this seems to have been developed in the 19th Century, before rulers, cutters and fancy fabrics arrived. The Manx women used what there was to hand, a bit like quilters in the UK and America. The big difference being that Manx quilting is made up of folded strips of fabric and stitched together through at least 3 layers of fabric using large stitches. Also, the Manx quilters used their hands as measurements because this would be a constant.

You may have noticed from the illustration that the finished design looks very similar to the American Log cabin design, this is where my confusion started! But just like their American cousins, hearth and home was important.

In Manx quilting the central square is usually red, this is to symbolise hearth and home. There is an excellent blog/ website where you can get full instructions for this fascinating regional craft. Just visit https://www.diaryofaquilter.com/how-to-piece-a-manx-quilt-block/

Montgomerie Trophy

For those institutes who are going to take part in this competition, I thought I'd better include some hints and tips to help you along.

- 1 It helps if you can get your base board early in the project, a cake base board will be useful, remember to cover it, I don't want to see any shiny bits!
- 2 Embroidery is a different craft category altogether, but you can embellish your creation.
- 3 Think about the weights of yarns when knitting and crocheting. Are they appropriate for the size of your design?
- 4 There is a wide range of different types of yarn available, textured, metallic, cotton, acrylic, tweed, wool etc. All of these can be used to great effect.

I look forward to receiving more entries. Don't forget ... I need to have your expression of interest by the end of July, just in case the Federation needs to get another craft judge.

VALERIE DAGGATT COMPETITON FOR CREATIVE WRITING

As part of the celebrations of Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee we are asking members to write a story based around their idea of the most important contribution to women's education, health and happiness that has happened over the past 70 years of her reign. So much has happened during this time including the contraceptive pill, the relaxation of the divorce laws, equal pay, greater opportunities in the world of work—the list of improvements in our lives goes on and on. I am sure all of you have tales to tell so please enter the competition and let us hear your stories. The cup will be presented to the winning writer at the Annual Meeting and we hope she will be able to read her story to everyone there.

LADY DENMAN CUP COMPETITION

This year the competition is to write a piece either comical, serious, fact or fiction using no more than 500 words which reflects the powerful impact when a community comes together. The entry requirements have changed this year and members are required to enter directly with NFWI and not via their Federations. Further information is available from My WI.

HUXLEY CUP COMPETITION

This year the Huxley Cup Competition, supported by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, invites WIs to design a small community space for wellbeing and wildlife. The wildlife aspect of the entry should focus specifically on the theme of: Our Fabulous Flying Friends—think about birds, bees, butterflies, moths and bats.

The competition is open to all members: entries must be submitted on behalf of the WI and not as an individual. Members are encouraged to work together to compose a design as only one entry per WI will be accepted. Further information is available from My WI.

MONTGOMERIE TROPHY

Institutes are asked to produce a tabletop display on a base board no larger than 46cm x 46cm (18" x 18") on the theme of "Beside the Sea".

This can be knitted, crochet, feltwork or a combination of these skills.

Institutes wishing to enter are advised to look at "On with the Show", the NFWI handbook. It gives guidance on exhibiting and judging criteria. It is available online at https://mywi.thewi.org

Rules: -

- 1. All items made are to be of similar proportion and scale and in keeping with the size of the board.
- 2. The board must be NO larger than 46cm x 46cm (18"x 18")
- 3. The board must be covered and to form part of the competition theme
 - 4. Appropriate toy filling must be used
- 5. As the entry will be judged from all sides, no backboard will be allowed, and
- 6. Judging will be in accordance with "On with the Show" guidelines and the judge's decisions are final.

Please note judging will take place in October 2022 and it is the individual Institutes resposibility to set up and display their entries on the day. Tables will be provided.

TRUSTEES TROPHY

This year's competition is on the theme of 'TREES'.

This competition for members is a photograph based on the theme of Trees.

- 1) The finished photograph/print must be no more the 7" x 5"
 - 2) Can either be in colour or black/white
 - 3) The photograph can be mounted.

The entries will be judged at our Federation event in October, so this will give you all plenty of time to come up with a stunning photograph!

Please note that the judge's decision is final.

Bees and butterflies



This is the time of year to start thinking about sowing those pollinator friendly plant seeds ... but first you need to get hold of some! There are many suppliers now advertising bee, butterfly and bird friendly mixes and most leading seed

merchants have one or more versions as do leading bee, butterfly, bird/wildlife charities. Some are wild flower seeds, others annuals for patio pots, borders, some fragrant mixes and of course you can always buy plants such as lavender, an all-time favourite. Generally, the best plants for pollinators have single flowers where access to pollen is easy.

It's also a good time to set up your bee hotel!

Good plants for pollinators:

The list is lengthy and can be found online but some of the best are lavender, borage, butterfly bush (buddleia), primrose, bluebells, heather, ivy, sedum and honeysuckle, foxgloves, and verbena.



Birds and the nesting season



Feeding birds becomes less crucial once winter is past but there's still need for fresh water both for them to drink and to bathe in. Last year, I found my small bubble fountain in a terra cotta pot was extremely popular!

Do make sure you've got your mechanical hedge cutting done early this year, i.e before March and watch carefully where birds are nesting as you'll need to leave them in peace until late August. If you watch carefully and know where the nests are, it's possible to prune carefully by, as long as you're avoiding their nests and not disturbing them. If in any doubt, search on Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 'bird nesting season' or http://rspb.org

Amphibians

Don't forget to check any pond or damp area to see if there's spawn that will become the next generation of frogs, toads or newts.



The newts in my small pond will emerge from the adjacent stone wall about this time of year and make for the water. They'll need shelter like overhanging plants to give the little ones cover when they emerge.

The best way that we can help our declining amphibian numbers is to make a small pond in the garden, ideally about 2 metres across, but even a much smaller area or a patio pool is likely to help. My frogs travel some distance across damp grass from garden to garden, pond to pond.
