We reported in June that many married women who hit state pension age before Apr 2016 and get less than 60% of their husband's basic state pension are entitled to a boost to get them up to that 60%, possibly backdated for years. If you are new to Showing, or a seasoned exhibitor,



please feel free to put forward any Showing questions you may have – all will be answered by an accredited W.I. Show Judge – and no question will ever be considered too trivial.

**Question:** What are the most common mistakes in Preserves and Cookery Classes?

**Answer:** with Preserves, failure to put the full date on the label (day, month, year), Jars that have not been checked for smears or stickiness, and the use of old lids.

In Cookery Classes, Failing to line the tin neatly, or using commercial tin liners. Also, not reading the Schedule correctly (and then double checking!) leading to the use of "unsuitable" ingredients for Showing, such as fresh cream or soft cheese.

#### **COMMITTEE NEWS**

In light of the fact that we are all being encouraged to 'Shop local', we thought you would like the opportunity to ready this article about Country Markets by Tricia Jones, Bicton and Oxon WI, Member of Federation Craft and Home Economics Committee

The roots of Country Markets go back to the early 1900's when the Agricultural Organisation Society (now DEFRA) invited the newly-formed Women's Institutes to become involved in its ongoing programme of setting up co-operative markets to sell surplus produce. Towards the end of the First World War, responsibility for the co-operative markets was moved to the Food Production Department of the Board of Agriculture. At the same time, the existing WI's agreed to form the National Federation of WI's as a separate independent voluntary organisation, although still receiving considerable financial support from the government.

Unusually perhaps the WI Markets always were and still are open to men as well as women. In 1995 a new sponsoring body called WI Country Markets was established as a self financing and self-regulating body without any NFWI involvement and in 2004 changed its name to Country Markets Ltd.

Country Markets are co-operative social enterprises that produce goods for direct sale to the public. They provide a retail outlet for high quality home-made produce and an opportunity for people to profit from their skills. There are Country Markets across England and Wales. Seven can be found in Shropshire selling home-made baked goods, preserves, honey, eggs, hand crafted items and seasonal home grown fruit, vegetables, plants and flowers. All the markets open in the morning when regulars know the early bird gets the best choice of the selection of goods on offer. Wednesday at Market Drayton and Oswestry, Friday at Church Stretton, Newport and Whitchurch, Saturday at Ludlow, Market Drayton, Newport and Shrewsbury. Shareholders don't expect to make a fortune but it can supplement an income. If you don't want to become a producer but have a few hours to spare and enjoy communicating with the public then most Country Markets are pleased to welcome helpers to sell items. Markets produce local food for local people, thereby reducing food miles. They promote regional food and crafts, many of which are unique or unusual, thus helping to preserve, and sometimes revive, traditional foods and crafts. Do come and visit a market near you.

SFWI Events Please apply for tickets through your Secretary/Treasurer/Booking Person. (Associate members may book direct with the SFWI office.) A 'paid' invoice will be issued on receipt of ticket monies, this will act as a receipt. Tickets are allocated after the last day of the month (in which the event is first advertised) to be fair to WIs meeting in the 3rd & 4th weeks. If the word 'non-members' is not printed on the application form, the event is for members only. If oversubscribed (too many applications for places received before the closing date), WI members have priority and a ballot may be held. Notification of cancellation or over-subscription will be sent to the Booking Person as soon as possible. No refunds are available, if you can't attend, it is up to you to sell your ticket (as appropriate).
