The Department of Health and Social Care is developing a 10-Year Cancer Plan to improve England's cancer services, and they are asking for evidence and ideas to help shape their plan. As part of our See the Signs campaign, the WI is teaming up with Ovarian Cancer Action to create a single submission on behalf of the ovarian cancer community. The survey covers topics including:

- The sources you go to for information on the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer
- Any ideas you have for how to raise greater awareness of the signs
- How confident you would feel recognising the signs & going to your GP if you experienced any
- What you would like to see prioritised over the next decade in ovarian cancer
- And about your personal experiences, if you have or have had ovarian cancer

## **International Women's Day 2023**



International Women's Day is a global holiday celebrated annually on March 8 as a focal point in the women's rights movement, bringing attention to issues such as gender equality, reproductive rights, and violence and abuse against women.





## The Million Women Rise March – Saturday 4th March 2023

Women from the West Midlands joined hundreds in the annual women only march to protest against violence towards women, locker-room culture and ingrained sexist behaviours within institutions such as the police force. It is held on the Saturday closest to International Women's Day. Members representing the West Midlands included *President of Harborne Village WI, Lynda Gibbon*, and *Nancy Coldwell, of Knowle WI.* 

## International Day of Remembrance for Victims of Modern Slavery - March 25<sup>rd</sup> 2023

This is a Global Day of Remembrance for the victims of slavery and the transatlantic slave trade, declared by the General Assembly of the United Nations. The legacy of 400 years of slavery still leaves its mark today, and the day serves to educate people around the world on the causes, consequences and lessons of the transatlantic slave trade, and to communicate the dangers of racism and prejudice.

## World Health Day – 7<sup>th</sup> April 2023

The World Health Organisation (WHO) observes its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary on 7<sup>th</sup> March. It began in 1948, founded by a desire of countries worldwide to safeguard their vulnerable and maintain the highest level of health and wellbeing for all. Each year has a focus, and this year to mark the anniversary the theme is "Health for All".

## Hedge cutting in Spring and Summer

As spring approaches, albeit hesitantly, here's the RSPB's legal advice on hedge trimming and cutting, which is subject to the Wildlife and Countryside Act of 1981.Some mature hedgerows are protected by law but this wouldn't normally apply to garden hedges.

We recommend avoiding hedge cutting during the main breeding season for nesting birds, which usually runs throughout March to August each year. This can be weather dependent and some birds may nest outside this period, so it is important to always check carefully for active nests prior to cutting. https://www.rspb.org.uk/birds-and-wildlife

## **Using Peat-free Compost**

After 2024, garden centres won't be allowed to sell peat compost so it'll be important to consider the pros and cons of the alternatives. If, like me, you've had some bad experiences with early peat free composts, I'm sure you'll be pleased to hear that the outlook is much brighter now.

Apart from their value as varied and specialised habitats, the urgency to protect natural peatlands has



taken on a new importance with the advent of climate change. Incidentally, they also provide a flood defence

'sponge', mopping up heavy rainfall and releasing it slowly into our river systems.

Peatlands are capable of locking up huge amounts of carbon ... they're 'carbon sinks'. When dug up and sold for us to grow our seedlings and fill our hanging baskets, massive amounts of carbon are released into the atmosphere. The amount of peat in composts has reduced by half over

recent years but the good news is that there are also perfectly viable alternatives. I'm told that the current forms of peat-free compost are much more effective than in the past and although more expensive, provide a pretty good growing medium.



## **Flowers for Pollinators**

Don't forget to sow some seeds for bees and other pollinators. Easy annuals like marigolds, sunflowers and other daisy like flowers, alyssum, cornflowers, antirrhinums, cosmos, zinnia, stocks, dahlias will always attract them, as will lavender and buddleia if you're thinking a bit larger! There are plenty of ideas online, just search 'flowers for pollinators"

A resolution is a call for change on a current issue in society. Once a resolution has been adopted at the Annual Meeting, the NFWI Public Affairs Department turns it into a campaign. Through national and local campaigning, members play a key role in achieving change on important issues.

## **Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife: The problem**

According to Surfers Against Sewage, sewage was pumped into rivers and seas nationwide over 400,000 times in 2020, totalling over 3.1 million hours of pollution.

Sewage is spilled into rivers as storm overflow. This is a mechanism to prevent capacity issues in sewage treatment systems, which can happen with high rainfall. Intensive livestock and poultry farming also contributes to river pollution in some areas through farm waste making its way into the water.

## The current situation

The UK has over 600 designated Bathing Waters – sites that are popular for swimming and paddling and have been designated under the Bathing Water Regulations 2013. The Regulations were put in place thanks to the EU Bathing Waters Directive that was first introduced in 1976. UK designated Bathing Waters are mostly coastal, with 16 lakes and two rivers.

Designated Bathing Waters are the only places in the UK where bacteria levels in open water are monitored and the data published. Gaining bathing water status requires joint working from swimming groups, community groups and local authorities, as well as data gathering, for example counting the number of bathers using a stretch of river over the summer.

The Outdoor Swimming Society state that bathing water designations have been 'hugely important in helping to clean up popular swimming spots.



## Points to consider

- The WI holds past mandates on the issue of water pollution and river quality, so this resolution could bring a new angle to this past work.
- Many organisations are already campaigning on this issue and the Government has taken action in the past months. Aspects of this issue that has received significant and sustained media attention over the last two years.
- The focus of the resolution is narrow. Would a campaign on this topic benefit from a wider focus to improve river water quality?
- The original title of Resolution 4 was <u>Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife</u> but there's no mention of *wildlife* in the text. The latter is of course a very valid objective.
- The statement on Designated Waters omits to mention the 16 designated lakes which exist as well as two rivers.
- This resolution seems to be purely about bathing waters and not wildlife
- There is some concern that unguarded bathing waters could be a potential hazard to children and particularly so in times of high water such as flooding.
