We started work on our entry at the beginning of 2023, with members contributing a variety of places and activities within the county. These were plotted on an outline of the county that had been painstakingly hand drawn on the back of a large piece of wall paper. We then planned a route around the county, taking in a variety of attractions together with a scenic drive. The 3-day weekend trip started and ended in Northampton, following a figure of eight around the county.



Friday: Northampton to Stanwick Lakes for a walk and breakfast, then on to the very north of the county, stopping at Lyveden New Bield, with lunch at Elsie's Vintage Tea Room in Nassington. Next stop was The Priest's House at Easton on the Hill, the most northern point of the tour. We travelled back towards Northampton through the beautiful Welland Valley - taking in the Welland Viaduct and many lovely villages - and on to Coton Manor Garden. Our first overnight stop was at The Aviator Hotel at Sywell.

Saturday: Beckworth Emporium was our chosen venue for breakfast, before a visit to Castle Ashby, followed by a drive through Salcey Forest. Lunch was at Stoke Bruerne, and included a trip up the canal in a barge and a wander around the canal museum. Dinner was at The Plough Inn, followed by a short walk around Bury Mount in Towcester, before heading back to the Saracens Head Hotel and bed!

Sunday: The day starts with breakfast at a small independent café (Clarke & Dean) in Towcester, a walk around the lovely Evenley Wood Garden, and then time spent browsing at the Brackley Antique Cellar. A short walk up the High Street taking time to have a peep at the Chapel of St John and St James before Sunday lunch at The Plough Pub, Brackley. Cosy and comfortable, with a log fire in colder months. On then to the National Trust property Canons Ashby, via Slapton, to visit St Botolph Church (famous for its late medieval wall paintings) and through Lois Weedon where the grave of Edith Sitwell (British Poet, critic and eldest of the three literary Sitwell's) is marked with a headstone made by Henry Moore. After Canons Ashby (which includes a Tudor farmhouse, Priory church, gardens, terraces, bookshop and a tea room), the final leg of the route is a pleasant drive back to Northampton through the Fawsley Estate and Badby woods (well known for an amazing carpet of bluebells during May).
