
Shibden Hall 13th May 2022

I had visited Halifax Piece Hall before but not Shibden Hall. The Hall is set in a beautiful parkland that appears to be well used by many people. Featuring a lake, children's play area & a road train to transport us from the car park to the hall itself. The somewhat bumpy ride to the hall got us all laughing commenting & enjoying ourselves. The Hall was something of a revelation a beautiful compact building first built in 1420 & added to over the years. The inside reflects all the additions having odd corridors & stairs. The main hall being the largest room with a stair case & galleried landing. Most of the other rooms are quite small with notices advising visitors to wait outside until others exit. I would recommend a further visit in a smaller party. Some of the scenes from the television series Gentleman Jack based on the life of Anne Lister were actually filmed in the house, others had to be recreated in the studio due to the small size of the rooms. The out buildings have been converted into a Folk museum with the coach house, Apothecaries, The Crispin Inn, Blacksmith, Basket maker etc. also an estate workers cottage that was

CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENT

India and Pakistan have been experiencing unprecedented temperatures since March. Northwest and central India recorded average maximum temperatures of 35.9 and 37.78 Celsius respectively in April. Those were the highest since India began keeping records 122 years ago. More recently a temperature of 51 degrees was recorded. I'm not sure I would cope!

India's per capita CO₂ emissions are below ours in the UK, as is the case for most if not all developing countries. The UK per capita figure in 2020 was 5.4 metric tons of CO₂ equivalents. The world average is 4.8. The highest emitter was Quatar at 37, the lowest are in Africa at 1 or less. Those who have contributed least to the Climate Emergency are suffering the most.

COP15 on Biodiversity



The 15th on Biological Diversity is scheduled to go ahead in China this Autumn. Its aim is to address the decline in global biodiversity and ensure that the decline of nature is arrested by 2030.

Nature is in trouble. According to the WWF Living Planet Report the abundance of all wildlife has declined by an average of 68% since 1970. Not only are we losing a multitude of species on a daily basis, but the actual number of each

species is declining at a precipitous rate. Our entire planetary ecosystems risk collapse within our lifetimes."

Is time running out to halt the destruction of life on earth?

Citizen science - The Bugs Matter survey

The Kent Wildlife Trust ran a simple science project last year which is easy to follow:

"We need lots of people to take part this summer, sharing findings from their journeys to help us understand more about our insect populations! If you have a Smartphone you can take part by downloading the app. It is available free for both IOS and Android. Create an account to sign up, and you will receive a downloadable grid to print. This grid can then be pasted onto cardboard, cut out and stuck to your number plate.

Start surveying on any journey you make in a vehicle between 1st June to 31st August. Zero counts are important too.

The results from last year's Bugs Matter survey have been published - the number of insects sampled on vehicle number plates by citizen scientists across the UK decreased by a staggering 59% between 2004 and 2021.



Are you interested in becoming an ACWW Co-ordinator?

ACWW is the largest international, nongovernmental, women's developmental organisation. It supports women around the world by advocating for them at UN level as a result of its consultative capacity and by funding small-scale development projects. There is a long association between NFWI and ACWW but the relationship between the two organisations has changed over the years and now NFWI's role focuses on providing guidance to WI members on how they can support ACWW's work if they wish to do so. For some years ACWW has operated "restricted" and "unrestricted" funds. Restricted funds are used for project funding only and it is why we write "WIPfF" on the back of cheques, to make sure our donation is only used for projects. Unrestricted funds fund every other element of ACWW's work and maintenance. However, this model is completely unsustainable as all projects have associated administrative costs e.g. processing donations, sending receipts etc. and rely on the overall existence of the organization to be

implemented.


Therefore, from 1st July 2022, ACWW are putting into place a single funding stream where all donations will go into a new fund called the Rural Women in Action Fund. This will support all aspects of ACWW's work, not just projects work. "Pennies for Friendship" will be phased out, as there is a belief that "if you only ask for pennies, you'll only get pennies", and by doing so, ACWW hopes this will affect donation size.

Alongside these funding changes, ACWW is establishing a global network of ACWW Coordinators. To become a co-ordinator you will need to be an individual member of ACWW and be willing to have monthly online meetings with other co-ordinators, the European Area President, and the World President. You will be expected to attend training and information sessions and actively encourage fundraising and donations.

A Co-ordinator is primarily an ACWW role and accountable to ACWW and as such, they will receive free training and support from ACWW. **Rosie Schlumper, our co-ordinator for many years, has retired, so if you are interested in taking on this role, please contact the Office.**
