Come September, my immediate neighbour informed my husband he needed to be home on the second Wednesday and I was taken off to a WI meeting. By January I was a new committee member taking the committee meeting minutes. It was a wonderful introduction to village life, which was so like my own experience as a child and was now enabling me to give the same to my sons.

I have held every position on the committee except Treasurer as this is definitely not my forte! In the early days I was persuaded to enter a competition at county level, which meant absolutely nothing to me, until I received a highly commended certificate for my sons' christening outfits. I was involved with the designing and creation of our WI tablecloth, which had a working party most weeks to complete the task. I was on the village show committee when produce and crafts were judged by County WI Judges and which has evolved into our main WI fundraiser Craft Fair, showcasing local producers and crafters, and also includes

hands on craft and art experiences for the community to 'have a go'. Throughout, my WI friends have helped me to survive postnatal depression, a divorce, hysterectomy, a house move, remarriage and spinal surgery - amazing forever friends.

In 2008, I embarked on the training to become an Adviser and, in 2010, was one of the successful candidates that appeared on the front cover of WI Life. (The only time this is ever likely to happen!)

For a number of years, I was the Group Co-Ordinator and have this year completed a stint as Membership Chairman. As an Adviser we visit WIs for a variety of reasons, the least pleasant being suspensions. My visits into new areas always seems to coincide with an evening of storms. I usually arrive at the venue okay, but have been on some very longwinded routes home - hunting country lanes for a signpost with somewhere I can aim for, before finding a sign directing me towards Leicester and on to finding something more familiar.

Advisers are invited to many different events and functions around the counties, which has been a great education for me. With the pandemic we have had to work in very different way.

I continue as a committee member at Stoney Stanton, a dual member of Earl Shilton Evening WI and an Adviser for LRFWIs.

### Food & Flowers Committee

### Some Festive ideas from Food & Flowers...

This month's suggestions from the Food & Flowers team include a couple of recipes from Gail - an Australian very nutty fruit cake and a tasty way with leftover turkey – and Jacqui's favourite cocktails and mocktails. Enjoy!

### Murrumbidgee Cake By Roger Bayley

A little butter for greasing the tin 200g whole shelled Brazil nuts 140g walnut halves 250g stoned, halved dates 100g chopped candied peel 175g glace cherries 100g seeded raisins Finely grated zest of 1 lemon 100g plain flour ½ teaspoon baking powder ½ teaspoon salt 140g caster sugar



3 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 tablespoons brandy or rum (or other alcohol of your choice), for soaking

1. Preheat the oven to 150C or 130C fan. Prepare a 1 litre loaf tin, lightly brush with butter, then line with non stick baking paper or buttered greaseproof paper.

2. Tip the nuts, dates, candied peel, fruits and lemon zest into a large bowl and mix them well. Sift the flour, baking powder and salt over the nut mixture, tip in the sugar and mix again. Beat the eggs and vanilla and stir into the mixture.

3. Spoon the mixture into the tin and smooth the top. Bake for 1½ hours in an electric oven, about 2 hours in a gas oven, or until a skewer inserted in the centre of the cake comes out clean. If it browns too fast, put a piece of paper or foil over the top to protect it.

4. When the cake is cooked, cool in its tin for 10 minutes, then turn the cake out and stand it the right way up on a large piece of muslin. With a skewer, make several holes in the top of the cake while its still warm and spoon in the alcohol of your choice. Wrap the cloth around the cake, then enclose in cling film or foil and store in a cool place until ready to eat.

### Turkey & Cranberry Ring

2 packets (240g each) chilled fresh dough for 6 croissants or ready rolled puff pastry

6 tablespoons mayonnaise

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

225g (8oz) cooked turkey (chopped)

1 stick celery (thinly sliced)

3 tablespoons fresh parsley (chopped)

85g (3oz) dried sweetened cranberries

85g (3oz) Gruyere cheese (grated)

2 tablespoons walnuts (chopped)

1 egg white, lightly beaten



1. Arrange the 12 croissant triangles around a baking stone, with wide ends overlapping, leaving a 5-inch opening in centre.

2. Mix together mayonnaise, mustard, black pepper, chopped turkey, thinly sliced celery, chopped parsley, cranberries and grated cheese.

3. Scoop mixture evenly over dough in a continuous circle. Bring points of triangles up over filling and tuck under dough at centre to form ring.

4. Brush with egg white and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.

5. Bake for 25-30 minutes at 190°C/375°F/Gas 5. Serves 8 as a main course or 12 as a taster.

<u>Cranberry Collins</u> 125ml/ 4 Fl oz Cranberry Juice 225ml/ 8 Fl oz Club Soda ½ Tablespoon Lime Juice Ice Cubes and Lime Slices

Mix cranberry juice and lime juice. Stir in club soda. Add ice cubes and lime slices.





### ALCOHOLIC COCKTAILS

Blushing Reindeer 25ml/ 1 Fl oz White Rum 25ml/ 1 Fl oz Dark Rum ½ oz Triple Sec 1tsp fresh lemon juice Dash Grenadine 4 strawberries hulled 1 strawberries for garnish Snowball Mocktail serves 4 Start this the night before... 25g/ 1oz sugar 25ml/ 1 Fl oz water 10g/ ½oz Mincemeat 300ml Vanilla Ice cream 100ml Iemon juice 500ml Iemonade or diet ½ tsp cinnamon 60g redcurrants

Heat the water and sugar until dissolved. Pour over mincemeat in a jar, leave overnight. Strain the mixture, measure 10ml of syrup mixture, mix with the other ingredients (not cinnamon and redcurrants) until white and frothy. Pour into glasses, dust with cinnamon and top with redcurrants to serve.

Combine all ingredients with 4-5 ice cubes and blend until slushy. Serve in a tall glass/flute garnish with a strawberry.





### <u>Poinsettia</u>

100ml/ 4 Fl oz Champagne/Sparkling Wine 7ml/ ¼oz Triple Sec Splash cranberry Juice Orange Peel to garnish Stir all VERY gently in a champagne flute. Garnish with orange peel.
