Supporting Ukraine

This is a message from the national Public Affairs team.

"We are deeply concerned about the ongoing situation in Ukraine and the threat that the conflict poses to civilians. We urge the UK government to provide humanitarian assistance and to do everything in its power to bring the conflict to an end and to protect the Ukrainian people.

We stand in solidarity with the people of Ukraine and all those fleeing violence. We have compiled a list of locations in the UK coordinating collections of clothing and other items to send to Ukraine or support refugees arriving in the UK." (There are currently no addresses listed in the Midlands but there are plenty of organisations listed online) "If you know of a collection in your area, please email us at pr@nfwi.org.uk so we can add it to the list.

Please note that as per the WI charitable constitution, WIs can only fundraise for charities that benefit the local community and therefore would not be able to collectively organise to raise funds, co-ordinate donating goods or anything of this nature to support Ukraine. All activity must be in line with the NFWI's fundraising guidelines. To find more information on our fundraising guidelines for members, <u>visit My WI</u>. This guidance is so that those who may want to help as individuals have the resources to do so.

What's needed? Warm clothing, sleeping bags, blankets, first aid kids, hygiene products, children's clothes and toys. Please check the details of your local collection point before donating.

If you have Ukrainian, Russian, or other language skills that could be of use to people fleeing the invasion and its attendant political crises in the coming weeks, please fill out this form to volunteer with Respond Crisis Translation.

<u>Translators Without Borders</u>, a well-established NGO is currently looking for volunteers. In particular, they need help from people with the knowledge of one of the following languages: Ukrainian, Russian, Polish, Hungarian, Czech, Romanian, and German."

LADY DENMAN CUP COMPETITION

This year the competition is to write a piece either comical, serious, fact or fiction using no more than 500 words which reflects the powerful impact when a community comes together. The entry requirements have changed this year and members are required to enter directly with NFWI and not via their Federations. Further information is available from My WI.

HUXLEY CUP COMPETITION

This year the Huxley Cup Competition, supported by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, invites WIs to design a small community space for wellbeing and wildlife. The wildlife aspect of the entry should focus specifically on the theme of: Our Fabulous Flying Friends—think about birds, bees, butterflies, moths and bats.

The competition is open to all members: entries must be submitted on behalf of the WI and not as an individual. Members are encouraged to work together to compose a design as only one entry per WI will be accepted. Further information is available from My WI.

MONTGOMERIE TROPHY

Institutes are asked to produce a tabletop display on a base board no larger than 46cm x 46cm (18" x 18") on the theme of "Beside the Sea".

This can be knitted, crochet, feltwork or a combination of these skills.

Institutes wishing to enter are advised to look at "On with the Show", the NFWI handbook. It gives guidance on exhibiting and judging criteria. It is available online at https://mywi.thewi.org

Rules: -

- 1. All items made are to be of similar proportion and scale and in keeping with the size of the board.
- 2. The board must be NO larger than 46cm x 46cm (18"x 18")
- 3. The board must be covered and to form part of the competition theme
 - 4. Appropriate toy filling must be used
- 5. As the entry will be judged from all sides, no backboard will be allowed, and
- 6. Judging will be in accordance with "On with the Show" guidelines and the judge's decisions are final.

Please note judging will take place in October 2022 and it is the individual Institutes resposibility to set up and display their entries on the day. Tables will be provided.

TRUSTEES TROPHY

This year's competition is on the theme of 'TREES'.

This competition for members is a photograph based on the theme of Trees.

- 1) The finished photograph/print must be no more the 7" x 5"
 - 2) Can either be in colour or black/white
 - 3) The photograph can be mounted.

The entries will be judged at our Federation event in October, so this will give you all plenty of time to come up with a stunning photograph!

Please note that the judge's decision is final.

Take action to protect our right to protest (NFWI)



We have joined over 350 other organisations in calling for changes to the **Policing Bill** which is currently making its way through Parliament. Now we need your help to ask MPs to protect our right to protest.

From our earliest days when WI members supported the suffrage movement, the ability to gather together to make our views and voices heard has been at the heart of all of our campaigns. Yet the changes in the Policing Bill will make it much harder for us all to take part in protests and marches.

As you've probably heard by now, the successful resolution for this year is as follows:

Women and Girls with ASD & ADHD - under-identified, under-diagnosed, misdiagnosed, under-supported received the most selections from members and the NFWI Board of Trustees has decided to put this resolution forward to the Annual Meeting. The overall votes were up by 10,000 this year.

WIs now need to decide how they want their delegate to vote at the Annual Meeting. There's more information on MyWI.

I'd like to give you my thoughts on why we have a Public Affairs Committee and how it fits in to the culture of the WI. We are the largest voluntary organisation in the country and we are well respected – we have a strong voice and our national team use it in Parliament and beyond. Campaigning is part of our culture ... working together to make things better!



We have 12 key and current campaigns which gives us a wide choice of which ones to support. SOS for Honeybees has been running since 1909 and is still extremely popular. Others like More Midwives have come and gone, either because the objective was achieved or else was picked up by others. Most recent are Stop Modern Slavery or No More Violence Against Women.

Those of us who are familiar with our WI website will know that there's a great deal of very useful information behind each of these campaigns and this is further supported by Zoom sessions, action packs and regular updates in PA Digest (free to every member). A small team of NF

individuals work very hard and produce a wealth of supporting information.

This may sound like a bit of a rant, but actually it's a plea. Many of you will not want to campaign, not feel it's in your character, but campaigning doesn't need to mean waving banners or getting arrested! It can simply mean, doing what you can to spread the word, gently and reassuringly passing on the message and providing as much information and support as is asked for. At the same time, the challenges of making green hearts, No More Loopholes bracelets or other craft activities to spread the word mean members working together ... having fun and achieving a common goal.

My plea to each WI is to ask one member to suggest a campaign which her WI can follow up with some activity. This might be a local visit, a talk by an expert, distributing fact sheets or else a related craft project. I'd be delighted if that person emailed or rang me and introduced themselves, I'd love to know or discuss their plans. I'd also love to have some of your photos to show at our Annual Meeting in July.
