AROUND THE WIS

<u>Farnley Estate WI</u>

Farnley Estate WI held its first meeting of the New Year on 10 January. It was a special meeting when the presidency of the group was handed from Susan Kerridge to Diane Hanline. Susan presided over Farnley Estate WI admirably for 4 years which included the difficult Covid years when members were brought together with Zoom meetings and an eagerly awaited monthly newsletter which Susan organised. It contained contributions from members about nature, poems and daily life. She was thanked for all her efforts and presented with a gift token.

The question of how Leeds City Council came to own one of the biggest parks in Europe, Roundhay Park, was also answered at the meeting. Henrietta Ryott, a WI member and the great, great granddaughter of Sir John Barran, gave an interesting talk about her ancestor and his life as a major Leeds clothing manufacturer in the nineteenth century. At its height his firm employed 3000 people. He was also mayor of Leeds and an MP for both Leeds and then Otley. Perhaps his **greatest** accolade, however, was his pivotal role in helping Leeds Council secure Roundhay Park for the citizens of Leeds. The talk was enhanced by two beautifully illustrated books presented to Sir John Barran at the end of his career by his staff and books about industrial Leeds with paintings of Leeds scenes. Members of Roundhay WI were welcomed to the meeting and were equally fascinated to hear about the origins of the park on their doorstep. Paula Scriven, Committee <u>member</u>.



Spofforth WI

Who would guess that premature babies and their mothers in the Neonatal unit at Leeds General Infirmary benefit from Spofforth WI (North Yorkshire), knitting group? This past

year they have been knitting heart bonding squares which are knitted in pairs, one is placed with the baby in the incubator, and one is given to the mother to 'wear'. The squares are then swapped so mother and baby get to know each other's scent, thus helping with the bonding process whilst they are apart. The neonatal nurse in the unit is very grateful to the knitters as the mothers love these squares and are very appreciative of them. The knitting group also knit hearts in pairs, which are given to the bereaved at St James' Hospital, Leeds. One is

for the family to keep and the other goes with the person who has passed away. This started during Covid and has continued as the families find it comforting. The Group has, for many years, also knitted squares, which are sewn together to make very colourful blankets. These are given to different organisations such as the homeless and as a comforter for those in need. Our most recent blankets and other knitted items such as hats and scarves, are being sent to Ukraine.We meet once a month for knitting, tea and biscuits and a chat - a great way to spend an afternoon! Her talk was both interesting and fun - even including a game of 'what can you find in the sack?' all objects pertaining to bell ringing, which we then had to guess,
