

Have you thought about joining the WI's Climate Ambassador scheme?

Do you feel passionately about protecting the climate? Join our amazing network of WI members who make a real difference by raising the issue of climate change to their MPs and wider community. In 2016 the NFWI decided to recruit WI Climate Ambassadors. We now have over 200 Climate Ambassadors registered across the country, who use their passion to talk about the impacts of climate change and what people can do to help.

The Climate Ambassador role depends entirely on your availability and is not a formal role. Some Ambassadors craft green hearts for Show The Love, while others focus on holding climate change awareness meetings with their MPs and wider community.

We would expect you to share messaging from the NFWI with your community and federation and take part in activities that the WI is involved with, for example Show the Love during February. We would also encourage Climate Ambassadors to support other WIs to get involved, this could include giving talks to WIs or encouraging them to take part in our activities. How will the NFWI support me? Once registered as an Ambassador the NFWI will send out regular updates to keep you informed via email. We are also on hand to provide you with support and advice on how to engage your MP and engage your WIs on this issue. We have lots of resources available which are tailor made for Climate Ambassadors to use. They include a 'How to Communicate Climate Change' guide, a PowerPoint presentation that can be used at meetings and top craft instructions including 'How to knit a climate scarf'. Early one evening at the start of April, six of us from two WIs met for one of the Federation's Nordic Walking taster sessions. Fortunately, the weather was not quite as nordic as the snow the previous week and the rain held off as well so we had lovely views across the Crimple Valley near the Yorkshire Showground. Out two instructors introduced themselves and the only equipment: a pair of poles each. Definitely not trekking poles and definitely used in pairs. After warming up and practising walking with swinging arms, we all managed to coordinate the same action with poles in

our hands. The result was a fast, bouncy pace and a workout for not just the legs but the upper body too.
