#### ACWW Report on the EUROPEAN AREA CONFERENCE

I attended the Conference which, this year, was held in Tirgu Mures Romania from 4th - 8th September. 162 delegates were booked from 17 countries and we were housed in the Grand Hotel and well looked after. On Tuesday 5th September the Opening Ceremony was held in the Palace of Culture, a grand ornate building in Art Nouveau style built in 1911. We were welcomed by local dignitaries. A plaque to one of the founder members, Madge Watt, had been unveiled in Canada. The World President talked to us about the rapid changes now taking place and reminded us that our 90 year old Society needs to keep pace with these changes to continue helping women worldwide. Guest speakers included Joanna Koch, UN Representative for Health Promotion who talked about the role of the ACWW to WHO and Veronica Shiroya from Kenya who talked about Health Promotion Workshops which were introduced in Kitale, Kenya four years ago.

Maggie Simmons, chair of Finance and Membership Committee talked about ACWW's work to improve women's lives and said that 17 new projects had been funded in 2016. Ann Marie Hovstad, Chair of Projects told us that , after 40 years in the field, over 80 countries have received funding to a total of £2.5million. We had a report from Čhristina Mates of Sibui on the Shelter project started 20 years ago and still giving a second chance to many women and children.

Pamela Brown and Therese Casemore of the Agricultural Committee reported on the focus on

knowledge sharing and awareness on three key issues; (i) Food Sovereignty (ii) Need to reduce food waste and (iii) the importance of breast feeding infants - it is thought 800,000 deaths could be prevented by breastfeeding. The next World Conference is in Melbourne, Australia on 4th - 10th April 2019. Please contact me if you would like more information on ACWW. Brenda Drake, ACWW Representative
