violence against women

This autumn members are being encouraged to take action to end the scourge of violence against women by pledging to take part in

16 days of action from 25 November to 10 December 2020. To find out more, visit thewi.org.uk The ACWW also has a comprehensive action plan, 'Orange the World' acww.org.uk

For the year ending March 2019, an estimated 1.6 million women across the UK experienced violence, including domestic violence, rape, forced marriage, sexual exploitation and other forms of abuse and harassment.

Violence against women in the UK is still widespread and further action on the part of Government is needed, which is why the WI is continuing to call for action to ensure the UK ratifies the Istanbul Convention.

Your vote is important and every vote counts, it will enable the WI to select another worthwhile Campaign to adopt and support.

Denman

West Midlands bedroom has been cleared. Furniture has been donated to Abingdon Women's Refuge. Federation belongings and crafted items are safely in our storage facility.



Christmas Tree Bunting



Materials – Oddments of Double Knitting yarn in various colours, pair of 3.5mm (size10) needles, beads etc to decorate

Method – garter stich. Cast on 21 sts, knit 1 row.

Dec Row – knit 1, knit 2 tog, knit to last 3 sts, knit 2 tog, knit 1

Knit 5 rows. Repeat these 6 rows 5 times more, then work dec row again, 7 sts left. Knit 1 row.

Next row Knit 1, knit 2 tog, knit 1, knit 2 tog, knit 1 – 5sts. Knit 1 row.

Next row Knit 1, slip 2 tog, knit 1, psso, knit 1 – 3sts. Knit 1 row.

Next row slip 2 tog, knit 1, psso, fasten off.

Trunk

With right side facing, pick up and knit 5 sts across centre of the cast on edge. Knit 6 rows, then cast off. Stitch in ends. Decorate.
