


Chairperson's Address



'Walk in her Name'

In memory of
Elizabeth Coleman.
March 2023 was Ovarian Cancer Month.

The NATIONAL WI is running a campaign this year 'SEE THE SIGNS' to raise awareness of the subtle signs and symptoms of Ovarian Cancer to help ensure that more women are diagnosed sooner.



Elizabeth Coleman, a **Kings Norton WI** member died very recently from Ovarian Cancer.

To commemorate her life, and to support the Ovarian Cancer Charity, I took a 13-mile sponsored walk as an opportunity to mark the life of a fellow WI member. As we go month by month to our local WI's we get alongside others with whom we might not otherwise cross paths. Fabric Conditioner

Ingredients

- 400ml white vinegar
- 30ml (2 tbsp) glycerin
- 40 drops essential oils of your choice

Method

Add the ingredients to a jug, mix and it's ready to go. Store in a bottle or jar

Use 2-3 tbsp in the fabric conditioner compartment of your washing machine

Here's the **Toilet Cleaner Bomb** recipe:

Ingredients

- 1 cup Bicarbonate of Soda (250g)
- 1/4 cup Citric Acid (63g)
- Spray bottle filled with tap water
- 40 drops essential oils of your choice Method

Put the Bicarbonate of Soda and Citric Acid in a bowl, and mix.

Add 30 - 40 drops of essential oil, and mix.

Spray the mixture with water – 2 sprays then mix,Keep spraying (2 sprays at a time) and mixing until the mixture starts to clump together like damp sand,(don't over water the mixture because it will start to fizz!)

Spoon the mixture into silicone moulds/paper cases and firmly press down so it's compact and all the edges are filled. Leave for up to 24 hours in a dry place and out of direct sunlight

Remove from moulds and store in an airtight jar. Use to keep your loo fresh between cleans.

Drop one into the toilet bowl (never the cistern!) and leave to fizz and do its work until the next time you need to flush.

Please read the contraindications when using essential oils. There are some that may irritate your skin, some are phototoxic, meaning they could cause skin burns on exposure to the sun, and some are extremely toxic to pets.

Coronation Crafts

I'm sure you have all been busy planning and making for the upcoming Coronation of King Charles III. Here are just of couple of ideas from us. Please send us your photographs of the occasion and the things you have made.

Kim's Knitted Chocolate Orange Crown



Materials required; oddments of double-knitting yarn in purple, gold, white and black. 4mm or size 8 knitting needles. Jewels optional.

Using white cast on 50 stitches and knit 10 rows in garter stitch. Change to gold and continue to knit 3 rows. Change to purple and knit a further 19 rows in stocking stitch. Do not cast off. Thread yarn through all 50 stitches on needle and gather tightly, secure end, then use this thread to stich the two sides together to form the body of the crown.

Next using gold cast on 50 stitches and knit 3 rows, cast off. Repeat this to produce to gold strips of knitting. Attach the gold strips with a few stitches so that they cross over the top of the crown. Stitch at the top to secure. Using gold cast on 10 stitches and stocking stich 5 rows, gather up both edges to form a ball. Stuff and stich closed. Attach to top of crown. Add a few stitches of black yarn to the white rim, to make it look like ermine fur. Decorate the crown with jewels or sequins if desired.

Add a chocolate orange if you can resist the temptation to eat it first.





Coronation Crochet Bunting

TRIANGLE INSTRUCTIONS

Using a 4mm hook and your choice of yarn shade either make a magic ring or ch4 and join with a ss to form a ring.

Round 1: Ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), [3tr, ch3] twice in ring, 2tr in ring, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [3 x 3tr-grps]

Round 2: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [6 x 3tr-grps]

Round 3: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, 3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1, 3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [9 x 3tr-grps]

Round 4: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] twice, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] twice; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [12 x 3tr-grps]

Round 5: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 3 times, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 3 times; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [15 x 3tr-grps]

Round 6: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 4 times, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 4 times; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [18 x 3tr-grps]

Round 7: Join next shade of yarn in any ch3-sp, ch6 (counts as 1 tr + 3 ch), 3tr in same ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 5 times, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1, [3tr in next ch1-sp, ch1] 5 times; rep from * once more, 2tr in first ch3-sp, join with ss to 3rd of beg 6 ch, fasten off. [21 x 3tr-grps]

Round 8: Join white (or preferred shade) in any tr through BLO, [work a ss BLO in each tr and ch along this side to the corner sp, ss BLO in first ch, 2ss BLO in second ch, ss BLO in third ch of corner] 3 times, work a ss BLO in each tr and ch to end of round, ch 1, cont with Round 9. [31 ss on each side of triangle]

Round 9: Work a ss BLO in each ss around to end of round, ss in beg ss to close, fasten off.

CARRYING THE SAME COLOUR TO NEXT ROUND

Work as per Round 1 of the Triangle Instructions but do not fasten off.

Coronation Crochet Bunting - continued

Round 2: Ss into the next ch3-sp, (ch3, 2tr, ch3, 3tr) in same ch-3sp, ch1, *(3tr, ch3, 3tr) in next ch3-sp, ch1; rep from * once more, join with ss to 3rd of beg 3 Ch. [6 x 3tr-grps].

To continue working more rounds in the same shade of yarn, ss into the next 2 tr and into the corner ch-3sp and work as for Round 2 but with the extra single 3tr-grps on each side as per the original Triangle Instructions.

Finish with Rounds 8 and 9 as above

The Original Coronation Chicken



The recipe "Poulet Reine Elizabeth" now widely known as Coronation Chicken was created by Rosemary Hume and the students of Le Cordon Bleu cookery school in London including, writer Constance Spry to be served at the Coronation Luncheon in 1953. The recipe is thought to have been based on a dish created for George V's Silver Jubilee in 1935. This was called Jubilee Chicken. The ingredients used were remarkable for their time, with many of them only

just becoming available, whilst the majority of the country was still under the restrictions of post-war rationing. The original recipe consisted of young roasting chickens, water and a little wine to cover, carrot, a bouquet garni, salt, peppercorns and a cream of curry sauce.

Many versions of this dish exist today, a more modern version is still served at 'Le Cordon Bleu'.

Although King Charles menu will not include this dish, we thought it a shame to banish it to the past.

Constance Spry's Original Coronation Chicken

Ingredients (Serves 8):

2.3kg (5lb) chicken, 1 tbsp vegetable oil, 1 small, finely chopped onion, 1 tbsp curry paste, 1 tbsp tomato purée, 100ml red wine, 1 bay leaf, 1/2 lemon juice, 4 finely chopped apricot halves, 300ml (1/2 pint) Mayonnaise, 100ml (4 fl.oz) whipping cream, Salt and pepper, Watercress to garnish

Method

Skin the chicken and cut into small pieces. Grill until cooked. In a small saucepan, heat the oil, add the onion and cook until softened. Add the curry paste, tomato purée, wine, bay leaf and lemon juice. Simmer, uncovered, for about 10 minutes until well reduced. Strain and leave to cool. Purée chopped apricot halves in a blender or food processor or push through a sieve. Beat the cooled sauce into the mayonnaise with the apricot purée. Whip the cream to stiff peaks and fold into the mixture. Season, adding a little extra lemon juice if necessary. Fold in the chicken pieces, garnish with watercress and serve.





King Charles Favourite Dishes

Charles is a lover of Italian Food; he likes simple pasta dishes such as Spaghetti and meatballs. He loves lamb or mutton, and is particularly fond of mushrooms foraged from the estate. Charles is a supporter of good British ingredients, organic and local where possible. He eats a mainly plant based diet, mindful of his carbon footprint, only eating fish or

meat on two days, he also has a dairy free day once a week. A special coronation menu has been created for him using his favourite ingredients.

We have picked a couple of his favourite dishes from his usual menu.

Cheesy Baked Eggs



Ingredients

100g wilted spinach,1 cherry tomato or sundried tomatoes, 35g strong soft cheese (e.g. Tunworth, Golden Cenarth or other strong soft cheese), 1 egg, 80ml double cream, 15 g grated hard cheese (e.g. Old Winchester), Fresh torn basil leaves, Charcuterie (optional)

Method

Butter a small ovenproof dish and line with wilted spinach, making a small well in the centre. Place the cherry tomato (quartered) or the

sundried tomato (chopped) on top of the spinach. Dot the soft cheese around the dish amongst the tomatoes. Add the torn basil leaves and the charcuterie if using. Season with salt and pepper. Crack the egg into the centre of the spinach. Pour the double cream over the egg - avoid breaking the yolk. Sprinkle with grated hard cheese. Place in a hot oven (180C) for 8-10 minutes. Let it stand for a few minutes before eating.

Cream of Lemon

For the Cream - 125g Heavy cream, ½ Lemon, 25g Caster sugar. Lemon curd optional

For the Biscuits - 40g Butter, 40g Caster sugar, 40g All-purpose flour, 1 Egg White

Method

Mix the ingredients for the biscuits together, adding the egg white last. Leave to rest in the fridge. Mix together the cream, sugar, lemon peel and heat up to 80 °C. Cool to 55 °C and add lemon juice when cooled, then heat everything up to 45 °C and pass through a sieve. Pour into glasses and cool in the fridge. Using silicone paper, roll out the biscuit mixture into a round shape and bake in the oven at 180 °C for 3-4 minutes. Remove from the oven and let cool. Put a drop of lemon curd if liked onto the cream and top with a biscuit.



Lynda's feedback has informed our campaigning and events during the year and we'd like to thank her for her enthusiasm to translate national policy into Federation actions. If any members with relevant experience would like to be nominated to join NFWI Education committee, Membership Committee or Public Affairs Committee, we would be happy to support them. (Please contact Lynn Smith) Lynda's explanation of the role in her own words is as follows:

In May 2021 I was invited to join the NFWI PA Committee as a Member Representative. I had expressed an interest in getting more involved with national campaigns after attending the Million Women Rise event in London in March 2020. Due to C-19 restrictions the Committee met three times a year in a virtual meeting space. All Committee members were given every opportunity to contribute suggestions and views before voting and decision making. Member representatives of the NFWI PA Committee provide 'voice' to campaign development and from lessons learned after campaigns are launched as they continue to evolve to get the best results for WI members and our communities. It was a very enjoyable, worthwhile experience and gave me an insight into how the resolutions process drives the development and delivery of national campaigns in partnership with NFWI, regional Federations and local groups. The tenure concluded in May 2023 and I would encourage WI members to volunteer and get involved to help shape the future of WI campaigning. Keen gardeners will tell you that caterpillars are the scourge of the growing season, eating their way through leaves before you've even realised they're there and leaving lacework behind. So, what does a hungry caterpillar eat? They seem particularly attracted to the brassica family, presumably because the strong, often fleshy, leaves of the cabbage family provide them with ample food for minimum effort.



If we take a more holistic view and consider caterpillars as part of the overall ecosystem, what do they contribute? They've emerged from eggs laid by butterflies or moths, which they'll eventually evolve back into through the pupal stage. In the meantime, they provide a significant food source for garden birds such as blackbirds, robins or bluetits but also hedgehogs, shrews, bats and spiders. In turn, these are eaten by predators such as owls, sparrowhawks and weasels.

Returning to the butterfly and moth stage, of course we all know that they are valuable pollinators. Many species are in decline due to changes and loss of habitat and food sources which were exacerbated by last year's spells of hot and dry weather. So, if we can bear to grow just a few plants for caterpillars, even a few sacrificial brassicas, we're helping to reverse this trend. Plants which are also very acceptable to them are nettles, while nasturtiums, foxgloves, hops, ivy, docks, dandelions, willow herb, brambles and native grasses and may also lure the cabbage eaters away from food crops. One easy organic deterrent I'm told, is to spray your crops with a solution of 3 cloves of garlic, 1 tbsp of vegetable oil, 1 tsp of soap and a 1 litre of water, but not immediately before harvesting, of course!



There are many more host plants for both butterflies and caterpillars, not to mention most of our



common woodland trees. Feeding research has shown that they eat many fruits and seeds as well ... even chocolate cake and ice cream, one survey has it! The thought that we're supporting the life cycle of one of our most beautiful insects must surely spur us on to tolerate the caterpillars for a short spell in spring or summer! Imagine our buddleias (the <u>butterfly</u> bush) without their mantle of industrious Peacocks, Red-Admirals, or Small Tortoiseshells collecting nectar in the height of summer!
