Giggleswick WI

An evening in April saw the celebration of seventy years of Giggleswick WI. Approximately 35 members came together to share stories and make history to create an atmosphere of fun and entertainment.Guests attended from Austwick Low Bentham and Settle institutes. Members came together in true WI fashion, arranging beautiful table displays, decorating the room with bunting assisted by their husbands and partners.

A fabulous cake was made by one of our members, which was cut by our longest serving member of 65 years, who also received a certificate from NYWFWI

The evening ended with a special performance of *Jerusalem* accompanied by the group Octameron. All these contributions created a hugely successful and enjoyable event



Our WI was formed in 1955 with monthly meetings held in the Parish Room rooms it immediately gained in popularity with membership exceeding 100 with so many applications a waiting list was formed. Some of the notable achievements over the years include an embroidered panel depicting buildings in Giggleswick and Settle to commemorate the centenary of the Parish Council in 1994 which is now on permanent display in St Alkelda's Church. Donations have also been made to various organisations including a high backed chair for older people at the local doctors surgery and wall clocks to the local school.

In 1965 to commemorate the National Federation of Women's Institutes Golden Jubilee a special scrapbook was commenced recording every aspect of Village life in Giggleswick. This also captured are own 10th Anniversary which is now a wonderful archive. There are pieces of fabric glued to pages to indicate the fashions for clothing, curtains, upholstery floor -covering and wallpaper representing life in1965. The village shops of the time are included with lists of prices and comments on high costs of some of the staple items shown eg cheese at 2/- per pound sugar at 9d per pound and coal 10/6 per cwt. So approximately 10p ,4p and 40p in current terms.

Giggleswick WI Report continued

1977 was the year of Queen Elizabeth's II Silver Jubilee which was a cause of patriotic excitement for the village including the WI. Amongst many other things yellow lines were introduced to the village that year with strong objection made by the WI of the time but to no avail.

In total five scrapbooks have been assembled over the years which capture in words and photographs our WI activities and at the same time changes within the village. They now make a very interesting archive about our WI and our beautiful village Our aim is to continue this tradition and produce a scrapbook for 2025 our 70th year and hopefully have the all books on public display somewhere in the near future.

As we move with the times, we now have a facebook page an email address and a card reader! Despite much smaller numbers we are still a very active and proud WI and follow in the footsteps of the ladies who established Giggleswick WI back in 1955. **Giggleswick WI**, wigiggleswick@gmail.com

Burton Leonard WI visit to the Houses of Parliament

On 14th May 2025, 6 members of Burton Leonard WI undertook a tour of the Houses of Parliament at the invitation of our MP Tom Gordon. Our guide, Phil, was very entertaining, full of anecdotes, tales and information about the history of the building and present-day procedures.

Unfortunately, we were not able to access the House of Commons as our tour coincided with Prime Ministers Questions (PMQ's).

However, we were treated to a visit to the House of Lords, but were only permitted to stand, not sit, as we were not peers. The chamber is beautiful with its red leather benches, golden thrones and colourful coats of arms adorning the walls. Fascinating stories of why the speaker of the Lords sits on the 'Woolsack' (reflecting the importance of the wool trade to Britain's wealth), the rituals of the State Opening of Parliament and who can/cannot be present in a debate in the chamber kept us enthralled. We stood in the room above the cellar where the gun powder plot was discovered and learnt about how the cellar is still searched today.



In the central lobby we learnt about the democratic right of any constituent to enter parliament and lobby their MP and stood on the spot where media interviews are conducted. At the end of PMQ's we gathered to see MPs file out and spot well known figures, testing our knowledge of key politicians.

In Westminster Hall we saw the location of the trial of Charles I and where several monarchs including the late Queen Elizabeth II lay in state. We discovered that the construction of Westminster Hall began in the reign of William Rufus (1087-1100) reflecting that the original building was once a Royal Palace, long before the notion of a Parliament had even been considered.



A highlight of the tour for many was to see the art work entitled 'New Dawn', high up in the wall at the junction between Westminster Hall and St Stephen's Hall. 'New Dawn' was created to celebrate women's suffrage, with its colours and design reflecting the long and arduous campaign fought by women to secure the vote. Another surprise was to see how the art work changed depending on the tide in the River Thames (pressure sensors in the river cause the art work to change).
