CARERS' WELCOME

Thank you to all members who took part in our research about dementia care and support for carers in hospital. In early spring, we plan to publish our findings and recommendations along with key actions that members can take to help us achieve change in policy and practice.

Over the summer, the NFWI launched a short survey to gather views on how loneliness could be tackled.

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NOT IN MY NAME

NFWI-Wales held 2 events at the Senedd on 21 November to bring together stakeholders and supporters to mark the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women (VAW) and White Ribbon Day on 25 November.

At 12 noon a panel debate was held based on the theme 'engaging men and boys in challenging all forms of VAW'. Panel members included Sophie Howe, Future Generations Commissioner for Wales; Richard Murgatroyd, White Ribbon UK; and Gwendolyn Sterk, Welsh Women's Aid. Pupils from Ysgol Coedcae in Llanelli were present to share a video they have produced around healthy relationships.

Later that day, a Candlelight Vigil took place at the Senedd to show solidarity with victims of VAW across the world. Following a short walk around the Pierhead building, supporters were addressed by Mair Stephens, Chair of NFWI-Wales; Joyce Watson AM; Julie James AM, Leader of the House; Nadia Salaman; Jemma Shepherd, Help4Wales Foundation; Garry Davies, South Wales Fire and Rescue; and representatives from each of the political parties – David Melding AM, Rhun ap Iorwerth AM, Kirsty Williams AM and Caroline Jones AM. To close the evening, Bechgyn Bro Taf male choir performed an octet.

END PLASTIC SOUP

Our <u>End Plastic Soup</u> campaign is calling for innovative solutions to stop the release of microplastic fibres into the environment. Microplastic fibres are small plastic fragments 5mm or smaller that are shed from synthetic clothes when laundered and end up in the sea and wider environment. Due to their small size, microplastic fibres are readily ingested by aquatic life, filling up their stomachs which can eventually cause death. We also know that these fibres are ending up in the food we eat, the long term effects of which are not yet clear.



Take action:

- 1. Learn more on the topic, watch 'A Plastic Tide' Sky's documentary looking at the scale of ocean plastic waste.
- 2. Use our template letters to call on your MP and Welsh Assembly Member to raise awareness of this issue.
- Register your interest to take part in the NFWI's washing habits survey to help understand the scale of the problem.
- 4. Hold an awareness day in your community and hand out our A5 checklist which outlines ways in which you can make a difference in the home.

FOOD MATTERS

Debate on supermarket food waste

On 25 July, NFWI-Wales held an event at the Royal Welsh Show which brought together consumers, producers and retailers to discuss the role of supermarkets in helping consumers reduce their food waste.

The event was chaired by Mair Stephens, Chair of the Federations of Wales Committee. Panel members included Ann Jones, NFWI Vice Chair and Chair of NFWI's Public Affairs Committee; John Davies, Deputy President of NFU Cymru; Alec Brown, UK Head of Stakeholder Relations at



Tesco; and Hugh Jones, Programme Area Manager on Food Waste Prevention at WRAP Cymru.

Food waste campaign successes

In a big win for the WI Food Matters campaign, WRAP, the Food Standards Agency and Defra have called on industry to review labelling on food products, and published new guidance on the design and use of labels to reduce food waste. This reflects what WI members called for in the Wasted Opportunities report.

We are also happy to see that the East of England Co-op will become the first major retailer to sell food beyond its "best before" date. They estimate that by selling this perfectly edible food, over 50,000 items every year which would otherwise have gone to waste will now be eaten.

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Food waste statistics

Thank you to all members who took part in the postcard campaign calling on all supermarkets to publish their food waste statistics. We will soon be handing in your postcards to supermarkets to encourage them to take action.

Food poverty

In the second phase of the Food Matters campaign, the NFWI will be launching a national debate on the issue of food poverty in March.

We will be producing a toolkit for WIs to take part in this national event by organising local events and taking action.

Help tackle holiday hunger

It is estimated that up to three million children are at risk of going hungry during the school holidays in the UK. To address this issue, in January 2017 the Welsh Government established a grant of £500,000 to fund lunch and fun clubs providing free meals to primary school children during the summer holidays. This initiative aimed to help reduce holiday hunger for children whose families find it hard to provide good food when free school meals aren't available.

Such initiatives do not exist across the UK. A new cross-party bill aims to empower local councils in England to offer programmes that provide free meals and activities for children in the school holidays. The bill is expected to have its next stage on 19 January 2018, but for it to progress further more MPs need to support the bill.
