I hope that the Treasurers who attended the Financial Statement workshops found it worthwhile. It was lovely to be able to be in WI House for this. The next Treasurers Workshops will be on Saturday 20 November.

We are now trialling invoicing for events, trips etc. Members can register their interest in an event individually, if there is sufficient interest for the event to proceed, WIs must then complete an application form. An invoice will be emailed to the WI Secretary and payment should be made by the WI Treasurer within 7 days of receipt of the invoice. WIs must collect the money from members prior to paying the Federation. Cancellations made up to 3 days before the Ticket Allocation Date will not be charged but cancellations made after that date will be invoiced and must be paid for.

It should also be remembered that by making a reservation for any event with NCFWI you enter into a direct (legally binding) contract relationship with NCFWI. Failure to pay for any event booked may result in action by NCFWI to recover the money and/or refusal to attend any future events.

#### MANDALA DOT PAINTING Saturday 4 September 2021 10.00 a.m. – 3.30 p.m. WI House Members £20 Non-members £25 plus £5 for materials payable on the day.

The mandala is an Indian tradition meaning 'circle of life'; a symbol of harmony and perfection. A stone with a mandala design is seen as an 'energy carrier'. Dotting a mandala design uses a traditional Aboriginal art form and is a gentle, mindful activity, focussing the mind away from everyday worries.

Tina, the tutor, casts her own stones and the materials pack provides everything you need, including

- two small practice stones and a 10cm diameter stone
- dotting tools & rods
- paint, 6 pots and brushes
- Sponge, table mat and cloth to wipe tools





After a "Welcome" cuppa, the mandala stone is painted in a base colour and later varnished. Tina will demonstrate techniques and designs to practice on paper and the practice stones. Your final design can be of your own making or choose from a selection of templates. Dotting the mandala on the 10 cm stone takes 2 -3 hours.

Dotting tools, rods and an 8cm pre-cast stone can be bought to take home if you would like to continue with this craft (£10).

**Roade WI** attended the celebrations to mark the centenary of the unveiling of Roade War Memorial, joining the parade with their banner and displaying some history of the WI during WW2 at the event afterwards.

Newspaper archives told of Roade WI organising a party in 1940 for 100 children evacuated to the village, raising money for Manfield Hospital, Great Ormond

Street Hospital, and the Prisoner of War Parcel Fund and knitting winter comforts for Roade men fighting abroad.

An article from 1950 told how the WI looked after the War Memorial for the village.

A scrapbook of information about Roade WI from 1928 onwards, plus a scrapbook for the Northants Federation 1982 project "Life in Your Community" were on display along with photos of events in recent years. The displays attracted a lot of interest and possibly 5 new members!

# **CARDIFF** 4 day holiday 20 - 23 March 2022 Members £415, non-members £430, single room supplement £45.00

We stay at the 3\* Holiday Inn, Cardiff, which is situated between the Millennium Stadium and Cardiff Castle – ideal for exploring this capital city. All rooms in this modern hotel have excellent facilities – air conditioning, iron, hairdryer, tea/coffee making plus satellite tv. A warm welcome is assured.

Cardiff has been the capital of Wales since 1955. Before the coal exporting explosion and during the 19<sup>th</sup> century, it was an insignificant fishing village. Once said to be 'not very Welsh'. The dock trade slumped in the 1930's and the city suffered heavy bombing in World War 2 but with the creation of Cardiff as a capital, optimism and confidence in the city blossomed. Many large governmental and media institutions have moved here from London, and the development of the dock areas has provided a positive boost to the city. It is bounded by the River Taff, the nickname of generations of ex-patriate Welsh.

The Taff flows past the walls of Cardiff Castle a splendid monument combining Roman, Norman and Victorian remains, and nearby the Millennium Stadium, home of Welsh rugby.



The centre houses many Edwardian shopping boulevards in Queen Street and High Street. North of the Castle are a series of white Edwardian buildings – the spacious civic centre around Cathays Park, home of the National Museum, City Hall and University College. The National Museum of Wales is said to be one of Britain's finest and attempts both to tell the story of Wales, as well as reflect the nation's place in the wider, international sphere. It contains a dinosaur gallery, science collection, zoology section, archaeology and the 3,000

year old Caergwrie Bowl dating from the Bronze Age decorated in gold leaf.

There is an Art Gallery containing the most infamous Cardiff Cartoons (4 monumental tapestries bought at great expense in 1979, and presumed to be the work of Rubens, something which is disputed amongst the Art world).

**Sunday** – we leave around 0900 hours and head south west arriving in Bristol late morning, where we visit the SS Great Britain. Your chance to step back in time on board Brunel's ship – the world's first great ocean liner. The ship has been brought to life with all the sights, sounds and smells of a pioneering voyage to Australia, from the Spartan functionality of third class passenger berths through to the opulence of the First Class Ladies Boudoir. Or just enjoy the shops and cafes.

Alongside Brunel's engineering masterpiece, the SS Great Britain, is the Brunel Institute, which houses one of the world's finest maritime collections. The Brunel Institute is a collaborative venture between the SS Great Britain Trust and the University of Bristol. Admission to this is also included.

Leaving mid-afternoon we continue on to our hotel. Time to relax before dinner, evening at leisure and overnight at the hotel.

**Monday** – This morning we have something a little different! A visit to the Royal Mint, Llantrisant. A guided tour is followed by freetime to visit the museum. The Royal Mint Museum has a collection of British coins of unrivalled importance. It sheds light not just on the coins as issued but also, through a unique collection of trial and experimental pieces, artwork and equipment, on their design and manufacture. Your chance to enjoy a fascinating insight into the history of the Royal Mint , the technological advances that over centuries have made minting to such exacting standards possible. Learn about the role of the people at the heart of this great institution; from the artists and engravers, to the Royal Mint officials, to the highly skilled production workers. There is a café.

We then drive to St Fagans, the excellent open air museum which has recently undergone a refurbishment. Plenty to see and a good eating house!

Return to the hotel late afternoon for dinner; evening at leisure.

**Tuesday** - Today we enjoy a morning in Cardiff. We have included a guided tour, taking in Cardiff Bay and the main sights of the young capital city. Cardiff Bay is 1 mile south of the commercial centre. With the construction of the Barrage, one of the largest in the world, to form a vast freshwater lake, the Bay has been spruced up considerably and now houses the various sites of the excellent Welsh industrial and Maritime Museum. The area used to be known as Tiger Bay, immortalised by Shirley Bassey. Cardiff Bay has become one of the world's biggest regeneration projects aiming to transform the seedy dereliction of the old docks into a designer heaven. The Norwegian Church was an old seaman's chapel and now a cafe.

We have also included a cruise around Cardiff Bay.

Freetime for lunch before we visit the Wales Millennium Centre, where we have a back stage tour – this lasts approximately 1 hour.

Return to the hotel late afternoon for dinner; evening at leisure.



**Wednesday** - Leaving after breakfast we begin our homeward journey. Crossing the Severn Bridge we arrive in Bath mid morning. Free time to explore this beautiful Georgian city, complete with abbey, lovely architecture, museums, shops and eating houses. Leaving around 1400 hours we return to our original pick up points early evening.
