This will be to Cheshire on Saturday February19th 2022 where our first stop is to visit Dagfields Crafts and Antiques Centre where you can find 25 Craft Workshops specialising in everything from handmade soaps to bespoke garden furniture as well as antiques and collectables. There is a Farm Shop and Butchers, and homemade food is served in two tea rooms.

Following this we move on to Bridgemere Garden Centre which is Britain's largest garden centre with six acres of award-winning show gardens and wildlife trails. You can buy from a huge range of top-quality plants and gardening products. The site also boasts a retail village with Hobbycraft, Lakeland and Cotton Traders. There is a restaurant and a separate café.

Public Affairs

COP26 finished at the end of November, and I attended a Climate Ambassador Coffee Morning which was designed to let everyone know what had come out of the conference and what the next steps would be for the WI. It did give a clear steer on the way in which Federations should be thinking for 2022 and the recording is available to view on the WI's You Tube. Here are a few key points:

- 1. We should be proud of the way that the WI is respected and not underestimate our ability to influence through our 400 Climate Ambassadors and 200,000 members at the grass roots. We can change attitudes.
- 2. **Show the Love** will be happening in February and an Action Pack, and much more is available on our WIU website. Members are encouraged to extend their *green heart* approach by promoting issues which are particularly relevant in their locality or to their MP. A green heart should be sent to every MP and meetings set up wherever possible. If response is poor, members should persevere, write again, knock on doors.
- 3. Issues we can focus on locally (for example):

Sustainability of our food production, consumer information and choice; housing development and energy use, carbon footprint; our natural environment, gardening, wildlife, and resources; transport, public and private. I'm sure you have many more in mind and have already been planning action.

Actions to take:

- Pursuing crafting initiatives, green hearts, No more Loopholes bracelets, pillar box toppers attract attention, but members can build on this introduction to spread the word and explain the message to others ... time to speak out.
- Join the Climate Coalition in sending Boris
 Johnson a Christmas card in the post to help
 ensure promises made at COP26 are kept ... or
 just add your name to theirs.

Resolution Shortlist 2021/22

At the NFWI Resolution Shortlist Selection meeting on 5th October 2021 member and federation delegates shortlisted five resolutions which will now be taken forward for further debate and voting by members.

The shortlisted resolutions are:

- 1. Fit for Purpose Fit for Girls
- 2. Appropriate Sentencing of Non-Violent Women Offenders
- 3. Equality in Law for the Menopause
- 4. Women and Girls with ASD and ADHD Under-Identified, Under-Diagnosed and Under-Supported
- 5. Tackling Digital Exclusion

Next steps

Every member now has the opportunity to cast their individual selection on the resolution they support the most. WIs are encouraged to hold meetings to provide members with the opportunity to discuss and learn more about each resolution. However, if this is not possible members can research the issues themselves and make their selection.

The deadline for members' selections to reach their federations is **14 February 2022.**

If you have any questions about returning your selection slip, please speak to your WI committee or your federation.

- allow members to submit their selections directly to the WI secretary via email or telephone;
- conduct an anonymous poll at a virtual WI meeting; or
- collect selections using electronic tools, such as via email or using a survey tool like SurveyMonkey.

A number of resources are available on My WI for each shortlisted resolution from the NFWI to support members in casting their selections.

Show the Love

Between 1 - 22 February 2021, WI members joined together to Show the Love for people, places, and planet - whilst being apart.

With February almost upon us, it's time to start thinking about the 2022 campaign.

2021 was by far the most unusual year for WI members to take part in Show the Love activities. Despite the challenges posed by Covid-19, WI members worked together to come up with innovative and ingenious ideas to Show the Love and raise awareness of the importance of taking climate action.

The NFWI saw the highest level of social media engagement in the Show the Love campaign that has ever been recorded, and during the campaign sent out over 450 resource packs to members across England, Wales, and the Islands. WI members continued to call on their MPs to take climate action at the highest levels of Government, championed community projects and raised awareness of the urgent need to take action for climate and nature.
