2021/21 Resolution Shortlist

1. A call to increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer

Every two hours in the UK someone dies of ovarian cancer. Making sure GPs and the public know what to look for will not only ensure the early detection and treatment of this disease, but transform lives today and for generations to come. NFWI calls on WI members everywhere to help increase awareness of the subtle signs of ovarian cancer.

2. Stop women dying prematurely from coronary heart disease (CHD)!

Coronary heart disease (CHD) is twice as deadly for women in the UK than breast cancer. To avoid premature deaths caused by a lack of awareness of the symptoms and misdiagnosis, the NFWI calls on WI members to improve understanding among the public and healthcare professionals of the symptoms of a heart attack and its prevalence in society, particularly among women, and to campaign to tackle inequalities in treatment.

3. Racism and discrimination

Systemic racism and discrimination is still a prominent challenge in society. The global protests surrounding the Black Lives Matter Movement have once again emphasised the extent of the inequality and injustice that people from BAME (Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic) communities still face across a wide range of settings including the justice system, employment, education and healthcare.

The NFWI and its members, in furtherance of their duties as citizens, agree to take concrete action to stamp out racial inequalities including by:

• campaigning for decision-makers to implement the recommendations of existing reviews on racial inequality, and taking action following forthcoming reviews;

 \cdot raising public awareness of these issues; and

• otherwise taking suitable action to increase recognition of, and help to address, this inequality and injustice.

4. Now's the time to act! Protect your nature space to create wildlife-friendly communities

UK wildlife is in decline, but solutions exist within all our communities. The NFWI calls on its members to participate in national schemes and local organisations and mobilise their groups to take action to protect wildlife in their own or local green spaces, protecting biodiversity and the environment, and creating a network of accessible wildlife-friendly communities throughout the UK.

5. Stop the destruction of peat bogs to tackle climate change

Peat cutting for compost is harming both our natural environment and our efforts to tackle climate change. 80% of peatlands in the UK are damaged and release millions of tonnes of CO2 into the atmosphere each year. The WI calls on its members to cease using peat-based compost, to persuade others to cease using it and to work with garden centres to encourage them to stock alternative products which already exist, thereby reducing the demand for peat to be harvested.

Food & Flowers Committee

Some Festive ideas from Food & Flowers...

The ladies who attended the Christmas Wreath-making day at North Kilworth last year will remember Jennifer's delicious Frangipane Mince-pies, and she is sharing her recipe.

Frangipane Mince Pies

Oven 180°C fan or Gas 6 Deep patty tins, makes approx. 16 (though I prefer the mini mince-pie size) <u>Shortcrust pastry</u> 8oz/200g plain flour 4oz/100g mixed butter and white fat 1 egg beaten with a little lemon juice and water. <u>Filling</u> Approx. half a jar of mincemeat or equivalent of home made. <u>Frangipane</u> 3oz/75g softened butter 3oz/75g caster sugar 3oz/75g ground almonds a few drops of almond extract 1 egg. Beat all ingredients together until well blended A few flaked almonds or halved glace cherries to top the tarts.



1. I make my pastry in the processor by blitzing the flour and fats with a little salt if you wish for approx. 30 seconds then add the liquid slowly pulsing to a stiff paste.

2. Chill for 30 mins then roll out thinly to line the patty tins.

3. Put a generous teaspoon of mincemeat into each and top with a generous teaspoon of frangipane. No need to spread it as it finds its own level.

4. Sprinkle a few almond flakes on top or $\frac{1}{4}$ or $\frac{1}{2}$ glace cherry.

- 5. Bake in preheated oven for 15 to 20 mins turning the oven down towards the end if getting too brown.
- 6. Delicious served slightly warm. Will freeze well.

As the Wreath-making day has inevitably been cancelled this year, Margaret has some tips on making your own festive door hanging.

Make your own Eco-Friendly Christmas Wreath

To make the base, without using floral foam, use – Willow / Birch / Twigs / Pine / Holly

- 1. Wearing gardening gloves, form into a circle or preferred shape.
- 2. Weave and tie with wire or string until it is firm and strong enough to decorate.
- 3. Next attach wire or ribbon so that you can hang your wreath.
- 4. Use wire, string or a glue gun to attach your chosen decorations.

Be imaginative – use any type of greenery, holly, ivy, cones, dried fruit, cinnamon sticks, berries, baubles, hessian or ribbon and weave through some mini battery operated lights for a little sparkle.



The possibilities are endless!





Reader Recipe

I came across this recipe in a magazine and it was delicious. Another good use of windfall apples if you have them. I used blackberries instead of the sultanas!

Apple & Almond Pudding

4 Bramley Apples 50g soft light brown sugar 50g sultanas (or blackberries) 100g butter 100g caster sugar 2 eggs 100g ground almonds 1 tsp ground cinnamon (or to taste) Flaked almonds



Peel, core and cut apples into bite size pieces. Add light brown sugar plus 1 tablespoon of water and cook until just soft. Add sultanas. Grease a 600ml pudding bowl and add the apple mixture.

Cream butter and caster sugar, add eggs then ground almonds and cinnamon. Pour onto apples and spread evenly. Sprinkle with flaked almonds if wished.

Bake at 180 degrees for approx. 45 minutes or until the topping is cooked through. Serve with crème fraiche (or your favourite addition!)



Book Review

"Where the Crawdads Sing" by Delia Owens



This is the debut novel of Delia Owens, who is a wildlife scientist and who has previously published three non-fiction books about her life in Africa.

Where the Crawdads Sing is a murder mystery with a difference. It is set in the 1950s and 1960s in the marshland area of the North Carolina coast and describes the life of Kya, abandoned by her family and known as the Marsh Girl, and the beauty and nature of her environment, so wild and

remote that you might even hear the crawdads (crayfish) sing.

The story includes so much detail of the wildlife of the area as well as the racial and social divisions of that era. I really enjoyed it and can thoroughly recommend.

Charlotte will take you through an introduction to silver clay, showing the process of capturing natural forms and turning them into silver jewellery. You'll get an insight, via demonstration and



videos, to mould making, shaping, refining through to firing and polishing. Charlotte teachs silver clay workshops in Hinckley, so if you like what you see you can book a workshop to learn the process in person!

Blackfordby

Taking inspiration from the famous ceramic poppies art installation at the Tower of London, the ladies of Blackfordby Women's Institute have been busy making their own version as a tribute to Britain's war heroes.

This time around they have knitted, crocheted and embroidered hundreds of poppies.

It was an idea which stemmed from our craft group, and it just



took off from there. More than 30 of our members contributed - some of them with huge numbers of poppies - and we are thrilled with the final installation."

One of our ladies also knitted purple poppies to make a special wreath to go alongside the installation. The purple poppy is a symbol of remembrance in the United Kingdom for served animals that during wartime .
