Make it Special

Use brush lettering to create beautiful watercolour stationery

* Card: peach, white, pale blue * Mountboard, blue * Paper, parchment * Pens: felt tips; watercolour brush * Mini pegs * Pearl gems * Adhesives Take inspiration from the colours of meadow flowers for Helen Fitzjohn's painted set of cards, pictures and a photo frame. If you've never tried brush lettering before, simply follow our pre printed guides and fill in with watercolours.

Mum's The Word

1 Trim white card, 13.5cm x 28cm, score at 14cm and fold. Cover the front in peach. Referring to the templates, print out the happy birthday 'H' onto white card, then colour the floral motifs using pens (see Craft Smart). Stick the letter to the front of the card and add a Mum mini sentiment and mini peg.

Pold an A4 sheet of parchment paper in half. Add an olive branch using green paint and a peach rectangle for the name. Measure in 3cm from each side, score and fold. Fold in the tabs and stick to create an envelope with an open top. Place the card inside and punch two small holes at the top. Tie with ribbon.





In The Frame

Print out the 'L' and colour as before. Cut out the rectangle and add a 2mm inset frame in peach card. Place a photo behind the inset. Add the L is for Love sentiment. Cut an 18cm square from peach card and add the L for love square. Mount onto a piece of strong card.

Home Sweet Home

Print the 'Home is where the heart is' design on plain white card and paint with watercolours. Add small pearl gems to the centre of the largest flowers. Take an A4 piece of blue mountboard and remove the centre, 19cm x 28cm, to create a frame for the picture.





Picture Perfect

Paint the 'H is for Happy' letter on white card and add a pale blue frame. Trim blue mountboard, 16cm square and remove 13cm from the centre. Tape the H behind the frame then add another square to the back to cover the tape. (6)

Scribble felt tip on plastic then pick up a little bit of the ink with a watercolour brush pen
